## **Cleaning Your Trumpet**

You will need the following:

A Snake,

Mouthpiece brush,

Denis Wick Valve Casing Brush (available online)

Clear dishwashing liquid that cuts grease, (like Dawn) – maybe have a color, but you must be able to see thru it!

Cup for the valves.

Bath Tub.

- 1. Fill the bathtub with warm water, **not hot** (you might drop your horn).....just enough to cover the horn. Use about 2 tablespoons of soap.
- 2. Completely disassemble the trumpet. Place the VALVES in the cup (filled with soapy water). **DO NOT OVERFILL The pads (felts) should not get wet.**
- 3. Place the trumpet parts in the tub and valve parts in the cup and let all soak for at least 30 minutes.
- 4. Work the snake thru the horn, but NOT the 1<sup>st</sup>, 2<sup>nd</sup>, or 3<sup>rd</sup> valve slides. Use the Denis Wick brush for these slides and the valves. Clean your mouthpiece too!
- 5. Rinse ALL thoroughly. Dry the outside with a soft cloth and place all parts on a bath towel to dry overnight (8 hours-BONE DRY).
- 6. Grease the slides, oil the valves liberally, and reassemble. The valve number etched the on the valve stem should be facing you when assembled.
- 7. Do once a month during marching band and twice in the spring.

## QUIK CLEAN - Weekly

Holding the  $1^{st}$  and  $3^{rd}$  valve slides in your hand...turn the trumpet upside down and let warm water run thru. BLOW the water thru the horn, HOLDING the  $1^{st}$  and  $3^{rd}$  valve slides. Wipe and Oil valves
